# **HEFMA 2025 Conference:**

### **Innovating Campus Spaces**

The countdown has begun for the HEFMA 2025 Conference, where over 300 delegates from institutions across Southern Africa will gather at North-West University (NWU), Potchefstroom, from 13 to 16 October 2025.

This year's theme, "Innovating Campus Spaces", reflects HEFMA's mission to reimagine the role of facilities management in driving institutional excellence and sustainability.



The conference kicks off with a landmark discussion on the professionalisation of Facilities and Asset Management as a recognised field within the built environment ecosystem.

Esteemed leaders such as Dr Msizi Myeza (CBE CEO), Ms Basetsana Khoza, Mr Simphiwe Hashe (SAAMA President), Mr Lufuno Ratsiku, and Mr Sherif Maged will unpack the roadmap toward full recognition of the profession and the possible establishment of a regulatory body.

A panel of Chief Operating Officers (COOs) will explore how data-driven FM practices can unlock operational excellence.



Meanwhile, Vice Chancellors and Principals from universities and TVET colleges will also come together for a powerful discussion on how Facilities Management can serve as a strategic business function for institutional sustainability.



The programme also brings global perspectives through some of HEFMA's international business partners, such as AUDE (UK), APPA (USA), and TEFMA (Australia). The keynote address will be delivered by Ms Nolwazi Gasa, DHET Deputy Director-General: Physical Planning, Policy & Strategy, setting the tone for an event that promises learning, inspiration, and collaboration.

## COOs Forum: Update

The Chief Operating Officers (COO) Forum continues to provide a unique platform for strategic dialogue among higher education leaders. To date, three successful forums have been held, with the most recent hosted in a hybrid format at the Central University of Technology.



At this meeting, COOs highlighted the urgent need for a national Indaba with local government stakeholders such as the Municipal Infrastructure Support Agent (MISA) and the Institute of Municipal Engineering of Southern Africa (IMESA). The aim is to strengthen collaboration infrastructure regarding management and service delivery in and around Higher Education Institutions.





The Presidency took a special moment to acknowledge and celebrate the remarkable women in attendance in honour of Women's Month. Tokens of appreciation were presented to them, accompanied by a powerful message from the President-Elect, Ms Hlamarisa Kubayi. Their dedication and impact in Higher Education Facilities Management and beyond were celebrated for shaping and inspiring future generations.



The next forum is already scheduled for the first quarter of 2026 at Sol Plaatje University (SPU), and anticipation is high for the important outcomes it will bring.

# Regional Chapters: Update

HEFMA's regional chapters have been buzzing with activity in 2025, creating vibrant spaces for localised collaboration and shared growth. Two workshops for chapter leaders have been hosted, ensuring leadership development and alignment across the network.

In addition, EXCO members have been actively engaging on the ground, attending several regional chapter meetings in regions including Eastern Cape, South and North Gauteng, Far North, KwaZulu-Natal, Western Cape, and the Central Region. These gatherings have proven invaluable in fostering dialogue, sharing innovations, and strengthening HEFMA's presence across Southern Africa.



The Central Region gathered for a chapter committee meeting on 15 August 2025 at Sol Plaatje University (SPU), North Campus. The chapter was warmly welcomed by Dr David Kanguwe (SPU COO), and the session created a strong platform for collaboration, benchmarking, and knowledge-sharing among TVET and university institutions in the region.

The KwaZulu-Natal (KZN) Regional Chapter held its face-to-face meeting on 26 September 2025, hosted by the Mangosuthu University of Technology (MUT), with 29 attendees representing both universities and TVET colleges. The meeting was marked by constructive discussions and important decisions that will shape the chapter's activities going forward.



Members welcomed HEFMA's presence and engaged in discussions that clarified its role in strengthening facilities management across the sector.

# TVET Maturity Development: Workgroup

**TVET** The Maturity Development Subcommittee has made remarkable progress in 2025, driving forward the facilities management agenda within the TVET sector. With a strong focus on strenathenina sector-wide advancing compliance initiatives, creating clear development pathways for TVET professionals, the subcommittee has cemented its role as a key driver of change.

This year's work has included updating institutional contact details across all 50 colleges, conducting a national assessment of TVET Facilities Management maturity, submitting a CETA Candidacy Pathway application, supporting compliance with Energy Performance Certification (EPC) requirements, and hosting monthly TVET institutional workgroup meetings. Each of these activities has deepened sector alignment and enhanced collaboration.

A major achievement was the creation of comprehensive national database, including Principals, Deputy Principals: Corporate Services/Finance, Facilities Managers, and Project Managers. Already shared with regional chapters, this resource has boosted participation workshops in and strengthened engagement across the country.

Another milestone was the successful submission of a CETA application under the 2025/26 Special Discretionary Grant Funding Window. This opportunity will assist TVET FMs to pursue candidacy pathways.



The Facilities Management Maturity Assessment has progressed significantly through a national desktop study. Findings, presented at the September TVET workgroup meeting, revealed common strengths and gaps. Recommendations are being refined into the TVET Maturity Development Report, to be officially presented at the HEFMA 2025 Conference.

Subcommittee Looking ahead. the remains committed to guiding the sector with vision and determination. addressing both immediate regulatory strategic priorities and long-term objectives, it continues to ensure that facilities management in TVET colleges is not only compliant, but also positioned as enabler critical of institutional excellence.

Ms Swazi Dlamini (HEFMA EXCO & Subcommittee Chairperson) shared her excitement about the progress seen throughout the Subcommittee:


